Disciplined fundamental investment process

Understanding risk and reward: how we decide what price to pay

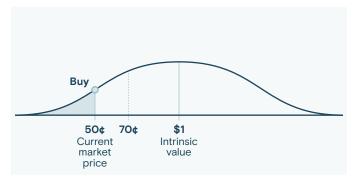
When our team considers buying a stock, one thing we look at is how predictable the company's future might be. The two charts below use bell curves to show this idea.

Narrow range of outcomes



This bell curve is tall and narrow. This means there's a smaller range of possible outcomes for the company—its future is more predictable. In this case, we might be comfortable buying the stock at 70 cents if we believe its true, or "intrinsic," value is \$1. Because we're more confident about what the company is worth, we don't need as big of a discount before we buy.

Wide range of outcomes



This bell curve is shorter and wider, with "fatter tails." This means there's a much wider range of possible outcomes—the company's future is less certain, and there's more risk that things could go wrong. To try to protect ourselves, we would only consider buying the stock at a bigger discount, say 50 cents, even though we still think it's worth \$1. This larger discount is called a "margin of safety." It helps reduce the risk if things don't go as planned.
